#### **Q**.1

The Core Strategic Vision statements fall short in not reflecting the District Council's responsibilities regarding the unique Chilterns village settlements, the built and natural environment, and other important heritage sites.

The Parish Council suggests that the following vision statement should be reviewed. - "A place with attractive and vibrant town and village centres and an outstanding countryside" -

The words 'attractive' and 'outstanding' fail to fully reflect the District Council's responsibilities; they omit 'protecting' and 'conserving' the rural environment from inappropriate development or land use.

The Vision Statements reflect how the District area is seen today, but do not acknowledge or provide for the rapid pace of change that the Chiltern District area will experience, particularly technological, demographic and social developments, over the next 20 years. (See also, comments under Q.3 which relate to the vision statement.)

#### 0.2

The Parish Council suggests adding the words indicated between \* and \* to the following two objectives:

Number 3 - Steer development to the most sustainable locations and ensure that new development is of very high quality design appropriate to its locality, and that it maximises efficiency in the use of energy, water and other resources, minimises pollution and waste and uses sustainable building practices, is designed so as to minimise criminal activity and has excellent access to sustainable transport \*and communication technologies i.e. broadband, mobile and their successors\*.

Number 4 - Encourage local employers and small businesses \*and the self-employed\* so we can protect the area's economy for the future.

The Parish Council also suggests the addition of a new objective, complementing Objective 5 but in relation to rural communities, namely -

Promote the vitality of villages through encouraging the viability of pubs, village shops, and communal facilities, such as village halls and recreational facilities - e.g. playing fields, playgrounds village greens and allotments.

#### Q.3

We consider the following to be some of the key challenges, issues and threats which will inevitably affect both people and places, and need to be referenced in the Local Plan: Threats to tranquillity due to increases in rail (HS2!) and aircraft noise from the proposed expansions to Luton and London airports. Other threats relate to climate change and disease epidemics impacting on woodland, environmental damage from flooding and pollution, and threats from the invasion of alien species on woodland and wildlife.

The Parish Council urges the District to 'future-scope' the Local Plan in the consultation phase, and include in its subsequent drafting strategies and mechanisms to 'future-proof' it. The new Local Plan needs to recognise

that as yet indefinable, local, national and global developments will emerge over the 20-year period to 2036 and will impact on the Chiltern District area in ways which are impossible to predict today (See also Q.1 above)

#### Q.4

Section 2.10 - We find the spatial strategy options lack definition and criteria and could be summed up by saying 'everything is on the table'.

We suggest some qualifying statements which ensure, for example, when proposing extensions to urban areas, that it will continue to be essential to maintain a sufficient buffer or gap between the edge of urban development and the edges of outlying hamlets and village settlements to avoid ribbon developments conjoining towns to rural settlements.

#### Protection for village settlements

The Parish Council would wish to see an explicit statement within policies defining the precedence of multiple planning policies applying to a development. For example, a row of properties or a village centre may be simultaneously subject to potentially conflicting policies concerning the Green Belt and Conservation Areas. In such cases the policy which affords the greater protection should prevail.

There is concern that removing the protection afforded to certain rows of properties in village centres could result in future development through infilling etc having a detrimental effect on the traditional village scene. We would wish this issue to be opened for debate in the forthcoming consultation on policies with proposals brought forward which provide both clarity and robust protection.

#### Infrastructure

This Council endorses the Community Infrastructure Levy. The Council also believes no substantial developments (multiple housing, commercial and industrial) should be approved without clear commitments and plans for the simultaneous construction of supporting infrastructure, by the applicant, by developers, and by relevant authorities. The Council is concerned about the often long delay between the completion of developments and the installation upgrading of highways, utilities, telecommunications, and the provision of additional health and education services.

#### Planning and enforcement

The increasing inability of District Council's Planning Department to cope with both the volume and complexity of its work causes this Council concern. In particular we have noticed a tangible reduction in the responsiveness of the Planning Enforcement section which appears to be de-prioritising cases in order to give the impression that caseloads are being satisfactorily managed with the consequence that infringements are allowed to go unchallenged or the opportunity to take enforcement action is lost due delay. With greater pressures on development it is of concern this will result in more cases where an inordinate delay in taking decisive action results in developments being permitted by default, thus undermining planning policies.

The Council is also concerned about the increasing tendency for applicants seeking planning permission to employ consultants and lawyers to use loop-holes to circumvent planning policies. It is important that the District Council designs policies which can counter such devious activities.

Consequently, the Parish Council would encourage the District Council not just to restore performance but to commit to responding professionally and promptly to future planning and enforcement workload demands.

#### Workforce capabilities

The Parish Council encourages the District Council to have a long-term focus but also agile approach to its human resource strategy. Key will be investing in improving and developing new skills, and raising the competence and performance of the workforce. It will be crucial that the Authority ensures its capabilities continue to be re- aligned with the very different challenges it will be facing in the next 20 years. In relation to

the Local Plan, this Council sees these issues as particularly relevant to those dealing not only with planning applications and enforcement matters but also for those with environmental and social cohesiveness matters. This Council would also wish to see: \* a stricter control through more robust policies in relation to preventing the demolition of existing buildings, to protect the character and setting of an area. \* a continuation of the presumption against new housing and commercial development in the Green Belt. \* the retention of those localities currently designated as conservation areas and continuation of the protection they are currently afforded through policies CA1-CA5. \* Chiltern District Council review the decisions that led to the removal of protection for settlement rows \* that the provision of affordable housing in rural parishes in the Green Belt and the AONB should only be permitted where there is a demonstrable need within the Parish and where the majority of those on the electoral roll for that Parish are in favour. \* that change of use of community assets, whether registered under the Localism Act or not, shall only be permitted in exceptional circumstances. \* Chiltern District Council develop new Local Plan policies sufficiently robust to minimise their evasion and press Government for amendments to the Permitted Development Regulations to ensure that they can no longer be used to circumnavigate core plan policies. \* that the development of agricultural, horticultural, and associated activities together with home based working should be encouraged as a means of sustaining the rural economy.
